Rideau Hall in 1865

As we climb the stairs of the Entrance Hall, the treasures of Rideau Hall are gradually revealed. With every step we take, we are adding to the bistory of this residence. Rideau Hall has a storied past as a vice-regal residence. It has been the official home and workplace of every Governor General since 1867. Also, its architecture has been modified over the years to respond more appropriately to the requirements of the highest official position in Canada. The rooms still used for official purposes include the Tent Room, the Ballroom and the Entrance Hall, where visitors are greeted.





Ballroom

The Ballroom was first used in 1873 for official ceremonies as well as for music, theatre productions and formal balls. Today, it is used for official ceremonies, such as:

• Swearing-in of the Prime Minister, Cabinet members and the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Canada;

- Installation of the Chief of the Defence Staff;
- State luncheons and dinners during visits by foreign Heads of State.
